Economic Development Committee: Trustee Steve Smith called the Economic Development Committee Meeting to order on Wednesday, January 27, 2010 at 6:30 p.m.

1. Growth strategies & recommendation to retain & attract businesses: Trustee Smith said we talked about developing some new growth strategies to be able to attract and maintain the businesses that we have in town. We will be talking more about this at our next meeting which will be next week.

2. Christmas Lighting Event: Trustee Smith said we have \$724.99 left over from the Christmas lighting which we are going to put in a CD. Trustee Smith said we also talked about having a Santa's Cottage built so we can have it located in the Village Park for the next Christmas Lighting event.

3. Summer Event: Trustee Smith said we have been approached to sponsor the July 4th fireworks. As a committee we decided not to pursue it--at least not this year. Trustee Smith said another summer event we talked about was to have movie night in the village park on July 17th and July 31st.

Trustee Smith said Village Administrator Dennis Herzing said that Bill Holtzmann was considering buying a five acre lot at the Industrial Park.

Legal & Ordinance Committee Meeting: Trustee Seth Speiser called the Legal & Ordinance Committee Meeting to order on Wednesday, February 3, 2010 at 4:30 p.m.

1. Community Improvement Board/Material Requirements on Commercial Buildings/Nuisance Abatement Code: Trustee Speiser said we discussed some material requirements on commercial buildings in the B-1 & B-2 zoning districts. Trustee Speiser said Village Administrator Herzing is getting something drawn up so we can get it to the Plan Commission. Trustee Speiser said Trustee Baker found some

corrections in the Nuisance Code that needed to be corrected. We should get this back next month.

2. Status of Public Hazard Homes: Trustee Speiser said a couple of letters have been sent to Mr. Sheets regarding one of his properties on North State Street.

3. New Class of Business License: Trustee Speiser said we talked about creating a new class of business license. Trustee Speiser said Mr. Anderson had a concern about last summer when other produce stands came into town. He would like to see us do something on this issue.

Public Property Committee Meeting: Trustee Tony Miller called the Public Property Committee Meeting to order on Wednesday, February 3, 2010 at 5:30 p.m. Trustee Miller said we mainly discussed the pool at this meeting.

1. Pool Feasibility Study/Referendum: Trustee Miller said we have the drain cover ordered for the pool.

2. Job Descriptions: Trustee Miller said we talked to Scott Schulz about the duties of the pool managers. Trustee Miller said there has been a request from Scott for a computer/printer to make it easier to track schedules and food orders.

Trustee Miller said we will hold our Swim After Dark Events on June 5, July 9 & August 6. Family Days will be held on June 13, June 27, July 11, July 25 & August 8. Trustee Miller said swim lessons will be held from June 14-21.

3. Lifeguard Hiring: Trustee Miller said we received 10 applications for lifeguard positions. We had 15 lifeguards last year, so we will advertise in the paper for some more.

4. Safe Routes to School: Trustee Miller said the only thing we discussed in Streets was Safe Routes to Schools and Dennis is working on this.

Trustee Miller said we will discuss negotiation of the contract with Rhutasel & Associates and MFT tomorrow night at our committee meeting.

Trustee Miller said also at the Public Property Committee Meeting, we changed job descriptions for the management positions at the pool. We now have a lead manager which will be Scott Schulz who will take on full responsibilities for everything at the pool and two co-managers and that will be their titles.

Trustee Tony Miller motioned that the salaries be set for the lead manager at \$4,400 and the two co-managers \$3,200 each and Trustee Corby Valentine seconded the motion. **ROLL CALL:** Trustee Tony Miller - aye; Trustee Corby Valentine - aye; Trustee Seth Speiser - aye; Trustee Rita Baker - aye; Trustee Steve Smith - aye; Trustee Charlie Mattern - absent; (5 ayes, 0 nays, 1 absent). All voting aye, the motion carried.

Committee as a Whole Meeting: Trustee Steve Smith called the Committee as a Whole Meeting to order on Monday, February 8, 2010 at 7:00 p.m.

1. Village's 3-year to 5-year Plan: Trustee Smith said basically we talked about the 3 to 5 year plan and we have to go back and re-prioritize those projects. Ron and Dennis are going back and re-prioritizing projects in the 3 to 5 year plan and then Steve will go back and update the plan and pass them back out to everyone to review.

2. Tax Levy: Trustee Smith said we talked about the tax levy and what our options would be and what the statutory maximum limits are for the various taxes.

Electric Committee Meeting: Trustee Corby Valentine called the Electric Committee Meeting to order on Wednesday, February 10, 2010 at 5:30 p.m.

1. Switchover of Ameren to Freeburg: Trustee Valentine said we discussed the switchover from Ameren to Freeburg power. Trustee Valentine said there are some differences that need to be cleared up and Ron and the crew will go out to make sure the list that Ameren has matches our before we enter in to the contract.

2. Three-phase Customer: Trustee Valentine said we talked about the three-phase rate change and said it really isn't a rate change. The ordinance we passed tonight is a modification of our existing ordinance that states if somebody uses less than 30,000 kilowatts they had to fill out a form to get the Rate 1. The ordinance we passed tonight makes it automatic. Trustee Valentine said several of our customers will see a lower power bill because they will get a lower rate automatically. They won't have to come up and ask for that rate.

3. Highway Lighting: Trustee Valentine said Ron is looking at lighting options for us on Rt. 15 north of town. Our first priority is going to be the intersections and get them lit up due to safety concerns. Then we will look at what it is going to take to light up the rest of the highway and how we are going to do that.

Trustee Valentine said that Ron filled us in on a bucket truck that is sick, the old

bucket truck we have is dying, it has been fixed for right now, but we need to think about ordering a new one.

Personnel & Public Safety Committee Meeting: Trustee Rita Baker called the Personnel & Public Safety committee meeting to order on Wednesday, February 10, 2010 at 6:30 p.m.

1. **Police Contract:** Trustee Baker said they won't be ready to start negotiations until April.
2. **Employee Handbook:** Trustee Baker said we had a lot of the employees here at our meeting and we went over the handbook that we are working on. They gave us a lot of good suggestions for changes in it.
3. **Employee Requests:** Trustee Baker said we also listened to list of requests they had for negotiations.
4. **Public Works On Call Status:** Trustee Baker said we discussed the public works on call status again.
5. **Job Descriptions:** Trustee Baker said and we also discussed job descriptions and we are hoping to conclude some of these things soon. Trustee Baker said the employee handbook is almost to the end of being completed.

Finance Committee Meeting
(Finance/Industrial Park/Economic Development/Budget)
Smith/Valentine/Speiser
Tuesday, February 23, 2010 at 5:30 p.m.

Chairperson Steve Smith officially called the meeting of the Finance Committee to order at 5:33 p.m. on Tuesday, February 23, 2010. Those in attendance were Chairperson Steve Smith, Trustee Corby Valentine, Trustee Seth Speiser, Village Clerk Jerry Menard, Village Administrator Dennis Herzing, Finance Clerk Debbie Pierce and Office Manager Julie Polson.

A. REVIEW OF BOARD AND WARRANT LIST: The Board Lists and Warrant List were reviewed by the committee. Steve questioned the three different vendors for police equipment - Streichers, Heros in Style and Galls, and Dennis advised they supply different items needed by the police officers. He also told the committee the police uniforms are owned and not rented. Steve asked about the expense to Bergkoettters and Dennis said he thought it was for repair to a police car transmission. He said Mel uses them since they are a Chevy dealer.

Trustee Seth Speiser motioned to recommend to the full Board approval of the Warrant List in the amount of \$58,409.05 and Trustee Corby Valentine seconded the motion. All voting aye, the motion carried.

B. REVIEW OF INVESTMENTS: Bryan had quoted a rate of 3.5% at last month's meeting.

C. INCOME STATEMENT: Steve asked about the franchise fee and Debbie said she has to wait until the end of the month to get the numbers in and that she has to make a payment for February and also March.

D. TREASURER'S REPORT: None.

E. OLD BUSINESS:

1. Approval of January 27, 2010 minutes: *Trustee Corby Valentine motioned to approve the January 27, 2010 minutes and Trustee Seth Speiser seconded the motion. All voting aye, the motion carried.*

2. Attorney Invoices: The expenses on the Watts' K-9 case should be almost done since the case has settled.

3. Health insurance renewal: We are waiting to hear back from Steve on the issue of having to pay for dependent health insurance if they have a job and insurance available through their employer.
4. 3-to5- year plan: The revised plan was provided to the committee. Steve will get it updated and copies to everyone.
5. Tax Levy: We will keep this on the agenda.
6. Penalty policy for utility bills: Steve asked if this committee is supposed to be making a recommendation on the penalty policy. Dennis said Ray wanted the trustees to be aware of our current policy to see whether or not we want to change it. The way Locis works, penalties are not penalized. Locis applies the penalty to the outstanding minus the previous penalty amounts. Basically, we penalize current and outstanding amounts, i.e. if you owe \$500 at the end of this month, you get a \$50 penalty and you don't pay anything, then the next month, you don't get penalized on the \$50 but you do on the \$500. The options we have with Locis are: we can penalize only the current amount, only the outstanding amounts, or penalize both. The committee decided to have Jane check with other communities to see what they do. We will also take this to the Electric, Water and Sewer committee meetings.

Corby said he would like to explore the option of giving our residents the option to pay \$1.00 more on their bill to contribute to a fund for residents that need financial assistance in paying their utility bill. We will check to see if Locis has that capability. The committee would have to set the qualification guidelines if we instituted this policy.

Steve asked if the credit from BHM&G has been used and Julie confirmed that it had.

F. **NEW BUSINESS:**

1. Bill Holtzmann: He requested to be placed on the agenda but was unable to attend the meeting. He wanted to talk to the committee about his plans to purchase a lot at the Industrial Park.
2. Compensation of Officials: Dennis said in the past we have compensated the board members and Mayor \$50 whether they attended a board meeting or not. A copy of our current code was attached and Julie said the language is not concise and needs to be corrected. A decision needs to be made on whether or not to pay the board if they don't attend a board meeting. Right now, if the board member doesn't attend a committee meeting, they don't get paid. Also, they only receive compensation for committee meetings that they have been assigned to. The committee decided to have this topic discussed at the next board meeting.

Corby said he noticed in the paper that Belleville is talking about instituting a wheel tax and said maybe we need to consider it in order to help the general fund. Dennis said he is working on the budget and both Mel and Ron are working on theirs and as soon as he gets all the needed information, he will get a proposed budget to the committee. He thinks it will be done in the next week or so.

Debbie asked if the Warrant List is necessary. She explained that once a warrant list has been printed, nothing can be done for a couple of weeks. Dennis said we need to check the code to see if it requires a warrant list be done. We will research this and bring it back to committee next month.

G. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION: None.

H. ADJOURN: *Trustee Corby Valentine motioned to adjourn the meeting at 6:22 p.m. and Trustee Seth Speiser seconded the motion. All voting aye, the motion carried.*

30.41 COMPENSATION OF OFFICIALS.

(A) Mayor. The Mayor shall receive an annual salary of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00), plus Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) per regular, special or committee meeting; provided, however, that he shall not be paid for more than six (6) committee meetings per month. The Mayor, while acting as Local Liquor Control Commissioner, shall also receive an annual salary of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00).

(B) Village Clerk. The Village Clerk shall receive an annual salary of One Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$1,800.00), plus Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) per regular, special or committee of the whole board meeting.

(C) Trustees. Each Trustee shall receive Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) per regular, special or committee meeting. No Trustee shall receive compensation for more than six (6) committee meetings per month exclusive of any regular or special meetings. Committee and special board meetings must be attended by the Trustee to qualify for compensation. Each Trustee shall be permitted to miss up to four (4) regular board meetings per fiscal year, exclusive of meetings missed for valid medical reasons. If any Trustee misses more than four (4) regular meetings in a fiscal year, other than meetings missed for valid medical reasons as determined by the corporate authorities, that Trustee shall not receive compensation for any meetings attended thereafter, whether regular, special or committee, during the remainder of the fiscal year.

(D) Treasurer. The Village Treasurer shall receive an annual salary of One Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$1,800.00).

(E) Attorney. The Village Attorney shall receive as an annual retainer, Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600.00), plus the normal fees that are allowed by the Village Trustees and as hereinafter agreed to.

30.42 MEETINGS. The regular meetings of the Village Board of Trustees shall be held on the first and third Monday of each month at the hour of 7:30 p.m., provided that if the regular meeting falls on a legal holiday observed by the village, the meeting shall take place on the following day at the same hour and place. Adjourned meetings may be held at such times as the Board may determine. (Former Code, § 1-2-3) (Am. Ord. 956, passed 10-18-99)

**SPECIAL PROVISIONS
FOR MOTOR FUEL TAX MAINTENANCE**

Materials and operations for Bituminous Materials and Seal Coat Aggregate or Blotter Aggregate shall comply with Section 403 of the Standard Specifications except that Repair and Preparation of Base or Existing Surface under Articles 403.08 and rolling under Article 403.13 will not be required. The preparation of the surface, closing of the streets to traffic during application of the bituminous material and blotting of the excess bitumen remaining on the surface will be done by others. The grade of bituminous material shall be furnished as directed by an authorized representative of the local agency. The Seal Coat Aggregate and Blotter Aggregate shall conform to the gradations as set forth in Article 1004.03 or those shown in the Special Provision included in the proposal.

All materials must be State inspected, and it is the responsibility of the Contractor to secure the inspection and reports.

The contract for furnishing materials under this proposal will expire December 31, 2010 or as specified in the proposal.

A. 95-0635 or shall have a collective bargaining agreement in effect dealing with the subject matter of P. A. 95-0635.

The Contractor and any Subcontractor shall file with the public body engaged in the construction of the public works: a copy of the substance abuse prevention program along with a cover letter certifying that their program meets the requirements of the Act, or a letter certifying that the Contractor or a Subcontractor has a collective bargaining agreement in effect dealing with the subject matter of this Act.

ST. CLAIR COUNTY

LABORERS (NORTH) - The area bounded by Route 159 to a point south of Fairview Heights and west-southwest to Route 3 at Monroe County line.

PLUMBERS & PIPEFITTERS (SOUTHEAST) - That part of the county bordered by Rt. 50 on the North and West including Belleville.

PLUMBERS (NORTHWEST) - Towns of Aloraton, Brooklyn, Cahokia, Caseyville, Centreville, Dupo, East Carondelet, E. St. Louis, Fairview Heights, French Village, National City, O'Fallon, Sauget, and Washington Park.

The following list is considered as those days for which holiday rates of wages for work performed apply: New Years Day, Memorial/Decoration Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Veterans Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day. Generally, any of these holidays which fall on a Sunday is celebrated on the following Monday. This then makes work performed on that Monday payable at the appropriate overtime rate for holiday pay. Common practice in a given local may alter certain days of celebration such as the day after Thanksgiving for Veterans Day. If in doubt, please check with IDOL.

Oil and chip resealing (O&C) means the application of road oils and liquid asphalt to coat an existing road surface, followed by application of aggregate chips or gravel to coated surface, and subsequent rolling of material to seal the surface.

EXPLANATION OF CLASSES

ASBESTOS - GENERAL - removal of asbestos material/mold and hazardous materials from any place in a building, including mechanical systems where those mechanical systems are to be removed. This includes the removal of asbestos materials/mold and hazardous materials from ductwork or pipes in a building when the building is to be demolished at the time or at some close future date.

ASBESTOS - MECHANICAL - removal of asbestos material from mechanical systems, such as pipes, ducts, and boilers, where the mechanical systems are to remain.

CERAMIC TILE FINISHER AND MARBLE FINISHER

The handling, at the building site, of all sand, cement, tile, marble or stone and all other materials that may be used and installed by [a] tile layer or marble mason. In addition, the grouting, cleaning, sealing, and mixing on the job site, and all other work as required in assisting the setter. The term "Ceramic" is used for naming the classification only and is in no way a limitation of the product handled. Ceramic takes into consideration most hard tiles.

ELECTRONIC SYSTEMS TECHNICIAN

Installation, service and maintenance of low-voltage systems which utilizes the transmission and/or transference of voice, sound, vision, or digital for commercial, education, security and entertainment purposes for the following: TV monitoring and surveillance, background/foreground music, intercom and telephone interconnect, field programming, inventory control systems, microwave transmission, multi-media, multiplex, radio page, school, intercom and sound burglar alarms and low voltage master clock systems.

Excluded from this classification are energy management systems, life safety systems, supervisory controls and data acquisition systems not intrinsic with the above listed systems, fire alarm systems, nurse call systems and raceways exceeding fifteen feet in length.

Class 2. Two or three axle trucks hauling more than 9 ton but hauling

less than 16 ton. A-frame winch trucks, hydrolift trucks, vactor trucks or similar equipment when used for transportation purposes. Fork lifts over 6,000 lb. capacity, winch trucks, four axle combination units, and ticket writers.

Class 3. Two, three or four axle trucks hauling 16 ton or more. Drivers on water pulls, articulated dump trucks, mechanics and working forepersons, and dispatchers. Five axle or more combination units.

Class 4. Low Boy and Oil Distributors.

Class 5. Drivers who require special protective clothing while employed on hazardous waste work.
TRUCK DRIVER - OIL AND CHIP RESEALING ONLY.

This shall encompass laborers, workers and mechanics who drive contractor or subcontractor owned, leased, or hired pickup, dump, service, or oil distributor trucks. The work includes transporting materials and equipment (including but not limited to, oils, aggregate supplies, parts, machinery and tools) to or from the job site; distributing oil or liquid asphalt and aggregate; stock piling material when in connection with the actual oil and chip contract. The Truck Driver (Oil & Chip Resealing) wage classification does not include supplier delivered materials.

TERRAZZO FINISHER

The handling of all materials used for Mosaic and Terrazzo work including preparing, mixing by hand, by mixing machine or transporting of pre-mixed materials and distributing with shovel, rake, hoe, or pail, all kinds of concrete foundations necessary for Mosaic and Terrazzo work, all cement terrazzo, magnesite terrazzo, Do-O-Tex terrazzo, epoxy matrix ter-razzo, exposed aggregate, rustic or rough washed for exterior or interior of buildings placed either by machine or by hand, and any other kind of mixture of plastics composed of chips or granules when mixed with cement, rubber, neoprene, vinyl, magnesium chloride or any other resinous or chemical substances used for seamless flooring systems, and all other building materials, all similar materials and all precast terrazzo work on jobs, all scratch coat used for Mosaic and Terrazzo work and sub-bed, tar paper and wire mesh (2x2 etc.) or lath. The rubbing, grinding, cleaning and finishing of same either by hand or by machine or by terrazzo resurfacing equipment on new or existing floors. When necessary finishers shall be allowed to assist the mechanics to spread sand bed, lay tarpaper and wire mesh (2x2 etc.) or lath. The finishing of cement floors where additional aggregate of stone is added by spreading or sprinkling on top of the finished base, and troweled or rolled into the finish and then the surface is ground by grinding machines.

Other Classifications of Work:

For definitions of classifications not otherwise set out, the Department generally has on file such definitions which are available. If a task to be performed is not subject to one of the classifications of pay set out, the Department will upon being

contacted state which neighboring county has such a classification and provide such rate, such rate being deemed to exist by reference in this document. If no neighboring county rate applies to the task, the Department shall undertake a special determination, such special determination being then deemed to have existed under this determination. If a project requires these, or any classification not listed, please contact IDOL at 217-782-1710 for wage rates or clarifications.

LANDSCAPING

Landscaping work falls under the existing classifications for laborer, operating engineer and truck driver. The work performed by landscape plantsman and landscape laborer is covered by the existing classification of laborer. The work performed by landscape operators (regardless of equipment used or its size) is covered by the classifications of operating engineer. The work performed by landscape truck drivers (regardless of size of truck driven) is covered by the classifications of truck driver.

A. OLD BUSINESS:

1. Approval of January 20, 2010 minutes: Trustee Tony Miller motioned to approve the January 20, 2009 minutes and Trustee Seth Speiser seconded the motion. All voting aye, the motion carried.
2. SAVE Site Water Situation: Dennis said he and Ron are meeting with Netemeyer on this Friday regarding the work for the current grant. Dennis said SAVE is looking at another grant from IGD to repair sewer laterals and has met with us to discuss putting together a new grant that will be due in late March. Once we get the details, we'll put together the grant application to do this and said if we are repairing and replacing in kind, we won't have to get an EPA permit.
3. Sewer Project: Dennis said Larry is in Florida and hasn't sent us anything.
4. Groundwater ordinance: Dennis has heard nothing.
5. Recycling: Dennis said the loads have increased and thinks they vary depending on what materials are in the bins. He said the weight tickets show that we are recycling almost double what the township did and are paying about double the price. Dennis told the committee he has heard talk the township is concerned with the cost of the recycling station. Charlie said if they don't continue to contribute half towards the current cost of the recycling, he hopes they would pay the monthly amount they had been in the past. Tony thinks they plan on at least paying what they had been. Dennis said Bill Weber, from Smithton Township and Ray Klein will be visiting tomorrow to take a look at our recycling center.
6. Sewer backup policy: Dennis said we are waiting on the control panel. Charlie asked where do we stand with Mike Blaies' request and Ron said Larry will look at it.

7. Grease trap problems: John hasn't done anything with this. The problems have to be coming from Meadowbrook or the shopping center. Dennis did send the Health Department a letter asking them if they were aware of any particular problems out here. He has not heard anything back from them. John thinks we should go out to the businesses and ask if they have a grease trap and see it and make sure there are no problems with it.
8. FSH System Requirements: Ron said we'll send out the application for the EPA permit on Friday.
9. Grade School bill: Dennis talked to Tomi at the school and told her no utilities would be turned on at that location. Tony has talked to some school board members and he thinks if we have to take it to the school board, it will probably be taken care of.

Ron asked if we want to have the city-wide trash pickup days that are usually held in April. We had to pay to get rid of the tires last year and the committee decided to eliminate the tire drop-off this year. We'll check with St. Clair County to see if they are going to do the tire drop-off this year. Ron is thinking about doing it April 16 - 19. Ron said we need to budget money for televising lines this year to try and locate the sewer infiltration problem areas.

STREET:

A. OLD BUSINESS:

A. OLD BUSINESS:

1. Growth strategies and recommendations to retain and attract businesses: Steve suggested we concentrate on the Industrial Park.
