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ELECTRIC COMMITTEE MEETING Thursday, January 14, 2010 at 5:30 p.m.

The meeting of the Electric Committee was called to order at 5:31 p.m. on Thursday, January 14, 2010 by Chairman Corby Valentine. Committee members present were Chairman Corby Valentine, Trustee Steve Smith, Trustee Tony Miller, Village Administrator Dennis Herzing, Public Works Director Ron Dintelmann and Office Manager Julie Polson. Guest present: Mike Blaies.

A. OLD BUSINESS:

1. Approval of December 9, 2009 minutes: Trustee Tony Miller motioned to approve the minutes of December 9, 2009 and Trustee Steve Smith seconded the motion. All voting aye, the motion carried.

2. Switchover of Ameren to Freeburg power: Dennis provided a copy of Ameren's most recent offer regarding the sale of their facilities and release of associated customers to the committee. There was an increase in the figure due to the addition of extending service to a lift station into the Orchards. The property owner told Dennis there was no easement through her property but Ameren confirmed there is. We are buying the entire line that serves Turkey Hill Lane and the lift station will have to be served from another way. Dennis said we did convince Ameren the lines from SAVE Site have been there since 1955 which brought the price down a little. Ron commented we need to make sure this easement is included in the agreement. This topic will be further discussed at the board meeting on Tuesday, January 19th.

A spreadsheet was passed out regarding Freeburg Care Center's estimated rate comparison and right now, we are about \$15,000 higher than Ameren. It was previously agreed by the committee that we will charge the Care Center Ameren's rate until Ameren's rate surpasses ours. Ron said Ameren currently has two rate increases pending. Dennis asked if we have an accurate mechanism to bill Ameren's rates and Ron said yes, he believes so. We have the ability to program the meter to what we need. Corby asked Ron to go out and check the meter because the off peak numbers are higher than the on peak numbers.

3. Village Utility Needs Analysis: Nothing new.

4. Replacement of old power plant doors: Nothing new.

5. Franchise Fee (Ameren): Waiting on this until negotiations with Ameren regarding the switchover of customers is done.

7. Three-phase service: The committee discussed this and agreed we need to clarify the electric rate ordinance to show the \$15 fee is a facilities charge. With respect to smaller three-phase customers, we will revise the ordinance to

automatically give Rate 1 to the smaller three-phase customers that are using less than 30,000 kilowatts rather than have them request the rate change. Dennis will prepare the ordinance for the next committee meeting and run it by Dean Park if we need to.

B. NEW BUSINESS: Steve requested the balance in the Christmas light donation fund and if there is enough money left over, we can put it into a CD. Corby brought up lighting Highway 13/15 north of town. Ron has some older poles that can be used and the committee felt we needed to start with areas involving a high level of safety so we will start with the intersections and go from there.

C. GENERAL CONCERNS: Tony asked for us to look into after Christmas deals on decorations for the park. Ron said they are trimming trees and will do so for the next couple of weeks. He also said the pole was taken down on a previous request from a resident on Jefferson Road.

D. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION: None.

E. ADJOURN: *Trustee Tony Miller motioned to adjourn at 6:25 p.m. and Trustee Steve Smith seconded the motion. All voting aye, motion carried.*

numbers together. Ron said we will be able to use the existing transformer that is out there.

3. Village Utility Needs Analysis: Dennis said Ameren dropped off information regarding the gas franchise renewal. Ameren is not providing free gas in this contract. Instead, they are offering to pay money starting at \$15,000 declining to \$5,000 for a 20 year contract. The current franchise fee in our ordinance is for electric. Dennis is not sure why they have a declining payment schedule in their proposal. Tony said we may be better off with a 5% franchise fee. The committee talked about charging 5% of the gross instead of the sliding scale Ameren proposes. Ron said Dean would probably have a good idea from the needs analysis of what the 5% gross amount would be. Dennis reminded the committee this new contract is only for 20 years and our old contract was 50 years. The current franchise expires in March of 2010 and if we don't sign the proposed agreement, we just continue under the terms of the existing contract. Ron said both Mascoutah's and Carlyle's agreements have expired. Corby said the committee needs some time to review this and would still like to meet with some of the other communities. Ron said if we are thinking about taking over the gas, we might want to have Dean re-work the numbers.

4. Replacement of old power plant doors: Ron said there is nothing new right now.

5. Franchise Fee (Ameren): Corby said we just discussed this and also said he doesn't want to do anything on this until the switchover of residents is complete. Dennis said the residents that Ameren hasn't been paying the franchise fee on will be a very small amount. Corby asked what our revenue would be from the franchise fee and would it be worth it? Tony said it hasn't been collected from the customers since this ordinance was passed and is really a moot point. If we do nothing, they why have it at all? Ron said right now, the franchise fee transfers money from the electric to the general fund.

7. Three-phase service: Ron said Jane came to Ron and asked why are we charging the 3-phase customer a \$15 flat fee. In the ordinance, it does not address a \$15 fee. The rate per kilowatt was correct in the computer and there was also this \$15 fee loaded in the computer. The \$15 fee was handwritten on Jane's informational sheet but not listed in the ordinance. Dennis said we had Dean Park look at everything and he said all the rates are in Locis correctly but no ordinance justification for the \$15 fee. That is why the letter was not sent. Ron said years ago, there was a \$5 single phase fee and a \$15 fee charged to the 3-phase customer. Ron said probably what happened was the \$15 either didn't get put back in the ordinance or was eliminated and not taken out of the computer system. This affects about 65 three-phase customers. We could make an ordinance to include the \$15, make an administrative correction and stop charging the \$15 or rebate the error. We don't know how far back we would have to go if we rebate the charge. To switch the smaller 3-phase customers, that will cost the Village about \$33,000 annually in revenue and add to it another \$4,000 per year. Ron will check with Troy Fodor to see how far back we would have to rebate and get the ordinance corrected.

ORDINANCE NO. 715

ORDINANCE FOR VILLAGE ELECTRICAL RATES

WHEREAS, the Municipal Light and Power Plant and System of the Village of Freeburg belongs to the Village of Freeburg and its inhabitants and has been constructed for the benefit of said Village and its inhabitants, and pursuant thereto the rates for the sale of electric current should be established so as to provide to the inhabitants of the Village of Freeburg electric service consistent with the proper management of said electric plant and system; and

WHEREAS, the rates for the sale of various classes of electric current were heretofore established by an ordinance entitled:

ORDINANCE NO. 684

VILLAGE ELECTRICAL RATES

passed and approved on the 4th day of September, 1984 and the rates as so fixed have been those rates in effect from said date until the present time; and

WHEREAS, a thorough analysis of the rates in force and of the operation and maintenance and costs thereof, of said Municipal Electric Light and Power Plant and System has been made, and it is essential that said adjustments in rates and classes of service be now made in the interest of good management and for the advantage of the Village of Freeburg and its inhabitants.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF FREEBURG, ST. CLAIR COUNTY, ILLINOIS, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: That Section 38-5-1 in its entirety and Sub-Section 38-5-7 (A)(1) are hereby repealed.

SECTION 2: That the following Section 38-5-1 and Sub-Section 38-5-7 (A)(1) establishing rates and charges for electrical service and private lighting luminaires are hereby adopted.

38-5-1 ELECTRICAL RATES. The following classification of electric service at the rates and on the qualifications, conditions and terms as respectively set forth are hereby established for the sale of electric energy by the Municipal Light Plant and Distribution System of the Village to customers adjacent to the distribution lines of the plant and system.

(A) Single Phase Service (Rate 1). Available for any residence, individual apartment, business or any other consumer located adjacent to the municipalities service lines, who utilizes single phase, 120/240 volt service, which shall not be available for resale.

(1) The charge per month per meter installation shall be:

Facilities Charge - \$5.00 per monthly billing period per meter installation (Note: One customer to pay this charge once only in one billing month in event of change of location or meter change).

plus

Energy Charge - (plus FAC to be added)

Summer - (for all bills rendered from June through September)

For the first 300 KW-HRS	7.73¢ per KW-HR
For all over 300 KW-HRS	7.06¢ per KW-HR

Winter - (for all months other than Summer)

For the first 300 KW-HRS	6.25¢ per KW-HR
For the next 1,000 KW-HRS	5.58¢ per KW-HR
For all over 1,300 KW-HRS	5.00¢ per KW-HR

Minimum Charge: Shall be the Facilities Charge.

(B) Three Phase Service (Rate 2). Available for any customer using three phase service for lighting and/or power.

(1) Net Rate. The charge per customer per month shall be the sum of the following capacity and energy charges:

Demand Charge -

\$5.00 per KW of the maximum 15 minute demand
(each Summer month), or
\$3.00 per KW of the maximum 15 minute demand
(each Winter month)

plus

Energy Charge - (plus (FAC to be added)

Summer - (for all bills rendered from June through
September)

For the first 50,000 KW-HR	7.0¢ per KW-HR
For all over 50,000 KW-HR	5.4¢ per KW-HR

Winter - (for all months other than Summer)

For the first 50,000 KW-HR	5.75¢ per KW-HR
For all over 50,000 KW-HR	4.45¢ per KW-HR

Minimum Charge: \$15.00

(C) Term and Form of Contract for Large Loads. The Village does not hold itself out as ready to serve, under the provisions of its standard contract for yearly periods, consumer whose requirements or whose increase in requirements, exceeds two hundred fifty (250) KW. Such capacities require special arrangements by both the Village and the consumer which may be made subjects of special agreement, both as to the form of the contract and other conditions requiring special consideration.

(D) Determination of Billing Demand. The billing demand each month shall be the maximum demand indicated in that month, but not less than seventy-five percent (75%) of the highest summer month billing demand for any of the preceding eleven (11) months and in no case, less than three (3) KW.

(E) Village Electric Service (Rate 5). Available for any Village purpose as approved by the Board of Trustees, which, in their opinion, would benefit the Village. Electric services under this rate are street lighting, water pumping, sewage treatment, Village Hall, etc.

(1) Rate. For all energy5.9¢ per KW-HR

Fuel Adjustment Charge (Rate FAC). For each 0.01 cent increase or decrease or major fraction thereof in the base annual average fuel cost and/or average cost of purchased power of 4.3 cents per KW-HR in the first

three (3) of four (4) months preceding the billing period, there shall be correspondingly added to or subtracted from each customer's bill, an amount equal to 0.011 cents per KW-HR times the total KW-HR billed to the customers, on all of the above rates.

38-5-7 DUSK-TO-DAWN LIGHTS. Rented Dusk-to-Dawn lights shall be provided as follows:

(A) Private lighting luminaires (Dusk-to-Dawn Lighting Services) for homes, schools, security, churches, commercial areas and industry shall be provided where feasible and in keeping with good electrical practice, as per the following specifications:

- (1) A self-contained automatic Dusk-to-Dawn 100-watt, 175-watt, or 400-watt mercury vapor lighting fixture shall be furnished and installed, or caused to be installed by the Village Electric Department, such fixture to meet standards and specifications of the Village, on existing wood pole structures for the customer's use at a monthly charge rate of Six Dollars (\$6.00) per unit for a 100-watt unit or a 175-watt unit, and Twelve Dollars (\$12.00) for a 400-watt unit, for a minimum two (2) year period. The charges per month shall be added to the customer's monthly utility bill and shall become an integral part of the bill.

The Electric Department will be responsible for making the installation, furnishing the electricity for the operation of the lamp, provide all the necessary maintenance (including the replacement of lamps, but excluding malicious damage) for the two (2) year period and all subsequent time additions to the length of service, as agreed to by the Village.

SECTION 3: All other covenants, terms and conditions, not hereinabove stated, as contained in Ordinance No. 684, remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 4: The rates and regulations hereinabove set forth shall become effective for all billings on and after June 15, 1987.

SECTION 5: This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and recordation according to law.

ORDINANCE FOR VILLAGE ELECTRICAL RATES

WHEREAS, the Municipal Light and Power Plant and System of the Village of Freeburg belongs to the Village of Freeburg and its inhabitants and has been constructed for the benefit of said Village and its inhabitants, and pursuant thereto the rates for the sale of electric current should be established so as to provide to the inhabitants of the Village of Freeburg electric service consistent with the proper management of said electric plant and system; and

WHEREAS, the rates for the sale of various classes of electric current were heretofore established by an ordinance entitled:

passed and approved on the 20th day of April, 1987, and the rates as so fixed have been those rates in effect from said date until the present time; and

WHEREAS, a thorough analysis of the rates in force and of the operation and maintenance and costs thereof, of said Municipal Electric Light and Power Plant and System has been made, and it is essential that said adjustments in rates and classes of service be now made in the interest of good management and for the advantage of the Village of Freeburg and its inhabitants.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF FREEBURG, ST. CLAIR COUNTY, ILLINOIS, as follows:

Section 1. That Section 38-5-1 in its entirety are hereby repealed.

Section 2. That the following Section 38-5-1 establishing rates and charges for electrical service is hereby adopted.

38-5-1 ELECTRICAL RATES. The following classification of electric service at the rates and on the qualifications, conditions and terms as respectively set forth are hereby established for the sale of electric energy by the Municipal Light Plant and Distribution System of the Village to customers adjacent to the distribution lines of the plant and system.

(A) Single Phase Service (Rate 1). Available for any residence, individual apartment, business or any other consumer located adjacent to the municipalities service lines, who utilizes single phase, 120/240 volt service, which shall not be available for resale.

(1) The charge per month per meter installation shall be:

Facilities Charge - \$5.00 per monthly billing period per meter installation (Note: One customer to pay this charge once only in one billing month in event of change of location or meter change).

plus

Energy Charge - (plus Fuel Adjustment Charges to be added).

(For all bills rendered.)

Rate 1

For the first 300 KWH	\$6.930 Cents per KW-HR
For the next 1,000 KWH	\$6.626 Cents per KW-HR
For all over 1,300 KWH	\$5.680 Cents per KW-HR

Minimum Charge: Shall be the Facilities Charge.

(B) Three-Phase Service (Rate 2). Available for any customer using three-phase service for lighting and/or power.

(1) Net Rate. The charge per customer per month shall be the sum of the following capacity and energy charges:

Demand Charge

\$3.60 per KW of the maximum fifteen (15) minute demand each month.

Rate 2

For the first 50,000 KWH	\$6.150 Cents per KW-HR
For all over 50,000 KWH	\$4.900 Cents per KW-HR

(C) Three-Phase Service Large Customer (Rate 3). Available for any customer using three-phase service for lighting and/or power with a demand equal to or in excess of 250 kilowatts.

Although the Village has established a rate for large loads, the Village does not hold itself out as ready to serve such loads within all reason of the community under the provision of its standard contract for yearly periods, consumers whose requirements or whose increase in requirements, exceeds two hundred fifty (250) KW. Such capacities in some instances shall require special arrangements by both the Village and the consumer, which may be made subject of special agreements both as to the form of the contract and other conditions requiring considerations.

(1) Net Rate. The charge per customer per month shall be the sum of the following capacity and energy charges:

Demand Charge

\$3.68 per KW of the maximum fifteen (15) minutes demand each month.

Energy Charge: (Plus Fuel Adjustment Charges to be added.)

For the first 50,000 KW-HR	\$6.09 Cents per KW-HR
For all over 50,000 KW-HR	\$4.84 Cents per KW-HR

(D) Vacation Rate. When a business which is classified under the three-phase demand rate as established under 38-5-1 (B) and (C) and is no longer operating as a business using a building or facility served by a demand billing rate and has not required the use of the three-phase demand service for the most recent thirty- (30) day period, they may request to be considered for the vacation demand rate. The request may be in writing prior to or after the thirty- (30) day period has elapsed. The demand customer, upon meeting the above-established requirements as a user, may choose to request the Village to place the business facility in question on a vacation demand billing rate for a period not to exceed twenty-four (24) months or the duration of the cessation of any business operation at the facility whichever is the shortest period of time. Once the facility is placed in use, one again, the owner shall notify the Village and begin paying the demand billing as per the normal rate calculation classification as any other ongoing business concern. The vacation demand billing rate is hereby established to be a flat monthly rate of Twenty Dollars (\$20.00) per month per each vacated demand metering device at individual business facilities to be added to any regular monthly meter reading of all metering devices or any and all minimum rates whichever is greater as provided for exclusive of demand meter readings. (Ordinance No. 805; 06-15-91)

(E) Determination of Billing Demand. The billing demand each month shall be the maximum demand indicated in that month, but not less than seventy-five percent (75%) of the highest summer month billing demand for any of the preceding eleven (11) months and in no case, less than three (3) KW.

(F) Village Electric Service (Rate 5). Available for any Village purpose as approved by the Board of Trustees, which, in their opinion, would benefit the Village. Electric services under this rate are street lighting, water pumping, sewage treatment, Municipal Center, et cetera.

(1) Rate. For all energy 5.9 Cents per KW-HR

Fuel Adjustment Charge (Rate FAC). For each 0.01 cent increase or decrease or major fraction thereof in the base annual average fuel cost and/or average cost of purchased power of 4.3 cents per KW-HR in the first three (3) of four (4) months preceding the billing period, there shall be correspondingly added to or subtracted from each customer's bill, an amount equal to 0.011 cents per KW-HR times the total KW-HR billed to the customers, on all of the above rates.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and recordation according to law.
